Wow! What a show! The 29th annual Metro Woodcarving Show is now history and to say that it was an outstanding event does not do it justice. This year's show was the best in my memory and undoubtedly ranks among the top Metro shows of all time. I have a number of reasons for those statements.

The number of exhibitors at 110 tables was very good. But the overall quality of the carvings and the stiffness of the competition were amazing. Our judges had a very tough job to decide the winners in many of the classes. The entries in several of the bird categories were really top notch. The overall visual impact of the hall and the displays really helped achieve our purpose of promoting woodcarving. Our show attendance was up over 75% when compared to 2007 with 1237 people present.

We had a very concentrated effort on publicity because we feared that the current state of our economy would adversely affect our crowd. The effort really paid off. All of the vendors that I spoke to were pleased with their results. Several new vendors were amazed at the friendliness of the

crowd—once again confirming that woodcarvers are nice folks.

I was particularly pleased the way that Metro members pitched in to help. Show set-up was completed early with all of the help present. Event co-chairman, Mike LePage and Bill Wolfe, did a great job. Mary Jo LePage handled the tough registration job in a very orderly fashion with advice and counsel from long-time registrar Barb Wolfe. Bill and Ruth Phillips kept the People's Choice running smoothly while Larry and Delores Lloyd had great results with the club raffles. Curt Chastain had the competition organized to a tee. Ticket selling at the door and the club table were covered very well. The carving competition was fun and the soap carving lead by Kayla Phillips was well received. Dick Jacobs arranged some very nice demos and Doug Evans kept all of the cashboxes and monies straight. We had a few small hiccups in the background, but everyone pitched in to solve these issues as they arose.

Congratulations and a great big thank you to everyone involved. Great job, team! This will be a hard act to follow.
